

Keeping Noongar Language alive

Teacher's Background Information

Like many other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander groups, family relationships are very important. Noongar people have large extended family connections that impacts on a child's upbringing. Noongar people use the same relationships terms like brother, sister aunty and uncle when greeting other Noongar people who are not related which is also commonly used by other Aboriginal groups across Australia.

It is a form of acknowledgement and respect to each other from one person to another.

Noongar Language

Noongar was spoken in a traditional grammatical form prior to European settlement of WA. policies of the 19th century impacted significantly on the use of **traditional Noongar** grammar, consequently the grammar changed. It is now evolved into what is termed **contemporary Noongar.**

Contemporary Noongar is heavily influenced by contact with English grammar. Contemporary and traditional Noongar language both are valid and used appropriately. Languages must be dynamic and evolved to survive. Research is being undertaken on both traditional and contemporary forms of Noongar language.

This package uses the contemporary Noongar Language.

Lesson overview

These activities will provide students the opportunity to engage in a step by step Noongar language learning program about family.

Key learning/ Purpose

- Identify and discuss different family structures;
- Compare similarities and differences of English and Noongar languages.
- the roles and responsibilities of family members
- Become more aware of the Noongar language;


Greeting circle

Steps:

- 1. First you need a Message stick (talking stick). To make one of these, simply take a tapping stick or a stick from the garden and decorate any way you like.
- 2. Once you have made your stick, gather your students into a circle.
- 3. Explain to the students you cannot speak unless you have the message stick. This allows everyone to have the opportunity to share.
- 4. To begin each student will pass around the message stick saying Kaya' (ki-ya) (meaning hello in Noongar language) and then pass it on until everyone has had a turn.
- 5. As you work through this program you can use other words This can also be done by introducing new words from the **Ocean** word list on page 3







Teacher notes Sentences

Create your own sentences.

Noongar language word order is very different from that in English. This is in the form of S,O,V (Subject object and verb.) Below is an example of the word order.

 Kwilena maambakoort-ak dolphin ocean -in Subject object/Location

2.The next exercise will give students the opportunity to use the Noongar word order. Let's start by introducing the key word; maambakoort-ak (ocean -in)

Maambakoort –Ocean (an object and location) –ak is the suffix added to describe in the house.

In the above example the suffix **-ak or -k** has been added to the object (location) word to show that the sentence says: **in** the house; **on** the house.

Note: -k: if a word ends in a vowel such as **a, aa, i, o, oo** then the suffix will only be - **k** as in miya-**k** shown above.

-ak: if the word ends in a consonant then the suffix will be -ak.

Here are two some examples:

- 1. goyara-k (sand-on)
- 2. ngobar-ak (sea shore-on)

Please refer to the Vowels and Consonants sounds on pages 15, 16 and 17.

Noongar Suffixes

Rules:

-k: if a word ends in a vowel such as a, aa, i, o, oo then the suffix will only be -k as in miya-k.

-ak: if the word does not end with one of the vowels below then the suffix will be -ak as in boorn-ak.

Vowels: a, aa, i, o, oo

Look at the last letter of each word, this will help you decide which suffix to use.



Art Activity Make your own fish tank


Things you will need:

- 1. Shoe box
- 2. Paper punch
- 3. Light Blue paint
- 4. Coloured pencils or crayons
- 5. Scissors
- 6. Glue
- 7. String
- 8. Tape
- 9. Clear plastic or light blue cellophane.


Instructions:

- 1. Colour each sea creature on the next page.
- 2. Cut out the ones you would like to have in your fish tank.
- 3. Punch a hole on the top of your sea creature.
- 4. Using your string, tie a length of string to your sea creature.
- 5. Paint the inside of your shoe box with light blue paint. Allow to dry.
- 6. Stand your shoe box on its side with one end open.
- 7. Now it's time to add your sea creatures. Using tape attach the other end of the string of your sea creatures to the roof of your shoebox.
- 8. Now it's time to cover the front of your shoebox with clear plastic or cellophane. Measure and cut enough plastic to cover the front of your shoebox.
- 9. Glue around the edges of the shoebox then attach the plastic.

Now you have your very own fish tank!



Fish tank sea creatures


